INTRODUCTION

In March 2024, the Australian Government launched the youth engagement strategy, Engage! which commits to improving engagement with young people in the decisions that affect them, and build the capability of Government departments and agencies to effectively engage with young people. A key commitment of Engage! is the Youth Engagement Toolkit.

The Toolkit is an evidence-based resource comprised of practical guides, and concise templates that assist in effective engagement with young people aged 12 to 25.


The Toolkit aims to support Australian officials by providing practical tools and frameworks that foster inclusive collaboration, align youth participation with policy objectives, and ensure that young people have an opportunity to shape decisions that impact their lives. Young people hold the potential to provide policymakers with new information and different perspectives to help approach challenges in a more inclusive and respectful way.

The Toolkit was designed in collaboration with officials and youth representatives. This resource values the diversity of Australia's youth population and aspires to support safe and inclusive engagement with all young people in government decision making. However, the Toolkit is a resource that can be used by any individual or organisation working closely with young people.



YOUTH ENGAGEMENT PRINCIPLES OVERVIEW

Through *Engage!*, the Australian Government has outlined the following principles for working with young people:



YOUTH ENGAGEMENT SUPPORT, BARRIERS AND FRAMEWORK

Across the Toolkit you will find advice on how to engage young people to access valuable insights and foster inclusive decision-making. With the right support you can create meaningful engagement initiatives that support young people to contribute effectively.

By embedding youth engagement in all stages of policy development, policies and programs that affect young people will be more responsive to the needs and aspirations of young people.

What works for youth engagement?

Successful youth engagement is often achieved when there is a supportive culture, adequate resources, and inclusive practices. Organisations that are genuinely committed to youth engagement have:

- a positive attitude towards young people
- a diverse youth network with many perspectives
- a commitment to accessible communication and engagement.



Effective youth engagement involves:

- Listening: Pay attention to what young people are saying and value their opinions.
- **Involvement**: Genuinely include young people in decision-making processes that affect them most.
- **Support**: Provides resources and guidance to help young people express their experiences and ideas.
- **Respect**: Treat young people as equals and acknowledge their contributions.
- **Opportunities**: Create chances for young people to lead projects and activities where it makes sense to do so.
- Education and upskilling: Offer training, mentorship and encouragement to build skills and confidence.
- Feedback: seek feedback on how to improve youth engagement methods and provide feedback on how young people's advice has been considered and adopted.
- Engaging with First Nations Young People: Engagement must recognise and respect unique cultural backgrounds, perspectives, and needs while celebrating and valuing the unique insights and experiences First Nations young people have to offer.
- **Ensure diversity**: Engage young people with diverse lived experience.

What has stopped meaningful youth engagement in the past?

Barriers can include:

- Being unsure of how to engage in a safe and inclusive way.
- Not having the resources and time to engage young people meaningfully.
- Not having the skills to engage young people in an innovative and age-appropriate way.
